



The new novel "SHOGUN", by James Clavell is a narrative of Japan in the year 1600. The author succeeds so well in portraying the ideals and characteristics of the Japanese during that era that the reader finds it easy to accept many of their customs.

One of the principal figures, John Blackthorne, an Englishman, is soon totally involved in this Oriental culture. His experiences in attemptingto control the trade routes between Japan and China, make it an exciting and fastmoving story.

Toranaga, one of the feudal Lords of Japan, plays an important part in Blackthorne's plans, as does a beautiful Japanese, Lady Mariko.

SHOGUN is well worth reading, not only for the story, but for its historical background It is available, by order, at the Library.
